Summer has been in full swing with travel, sun, and thunderstorms. Please read the list of the activities your volunteer civic association has achieved over the last year. The generosity of our board members and committee chairs never ceases to amaze me. The effort of each of our volunteers and their concern for our community shows intentional engagement and thoughtfulness for our neighborhood.

Less than 26% of 1,032 homes contribute to our voluntary annual dues of \$150. Thank you so much to those regular yearly contributors. Every payment makes a difference. The Board completed a comparison of HOA and Civic Associations in surrounding areas - please see the article below.

Unless our participation improves to 35%, we have determined that we must increase our dues during the following fiscal year (September 2026-August 2027). Security remains the largest component of our voluntary dues. As you may have heard about Harris County increasing the pay of their constables to align with HPD officers, we believe we must keep our off duty HPD officers, who staff our security patrol, in parity with other neighborhood organizations. Our civic association is one of the few with all off duty HPD officers on our security patrol. Officer Thompson has been employed by our precinct for over 25 years and coordinates our officers patrol during times when any criminal activity seems more frequent.

National Night Out is on October 7. Caroline Burnam is heading up this year's coordination and will be delivering balloons and signs to block hosts. Please consider being your block host for a couple of hours. More information to come!

Area Homeowners' Associations and Civic Associations


Homeowners' association fees are mandatory, and civic associations have voluntary fees. Willow Meadows homeowners' association charges a mandatory \$435 per year. Knollwood Village Civic Club is a civic association, and their dues are \$290 per year. Meyerland Community Improvement Association is an HOA. Their mandatory annual dues are \$700. Westbury has two HOAs – Parkwest 1 & Parkwest 2. Parkwest mandatory fees are \$300 per year. All other Westbury groups are civic clubs with voluntary dues. One of the Westbury voluntary groups charges \$385 per year with \$325 going for security. Westbury HOAs and CAs hire constables to patrol their neighborhoods.

Election Results

At the June meeting, residents voted to re-elect Alison Mitchell for President, Barbara Beard for Secretary, and Susan Forrest for East Post Oak Manor Area Representative. We are looking for an Interim East Willowbrook Area Representative.

We also voted to amend our bylaws according to the notices we sent out in May and Junes.

In accordance with the newly enacted bylaws, we've added two At-large Area Representatives. The Board voted to appoint Evan Brough as Interim At-large Area Representative, Place 5. The Board is still considering candidates for Interim At-large Area Representative, Place 6.





Thank you to outgoing volunteer Janeen Paprocki for serving as East Willowbrook Area Representative. Janeen will continue to serve as head of the Yard of the Month Committee.

Security Report

Crime rates in our area are lower than surrounding areas. Officer Thompson, our Chief Security Patrol Officer for almost 32 years, advises our residents to:

- Keep vehicles in the garage whenever possible and do not leave valuables in vehicles, particularly firearms.
- Remind lawn crews and contractors to secure their items.
- Know your neighbors! Introduce yourself and exchange numbers so you can help each other recognize unusual activity on the street.

Domestic Violence in Our Neighborhood

At our recent public meeting, Edith Napoleon mentioned during security updates that while domestic violence is not an area that our club tracks or reports on, we are aware of a number of incidents per year through public records and conversations with Officer Thompson. Unfortunately, this is not unique to our neighborhood.

Edith clarified with Officer Thompson after the meeting that at all domestic violence calls attended by him or other HPD officers, the officers communicate the availability of free city resources regarding shelter, counseling, and legal assistance through various agencies.

What exactly is domestic violence (DV)?

In short, it is a violent act that occurs between individuals who live in the same household or have a child in common. When it is between couples, it is called Intimate Partner Violence (IPV). The violent act may be physical, emotional, or sexual abuse. It is not a private matter. It is a crime with long-lasting effects. Children who witness domestic violence between their parents usually have life-long consequences to their physical and mental health. Victims of DV also experience physical and mental health consequences.

What to do if you are experiencing domestic violence?

If you feel in danger, always call 911. If you are not in imminent danger, there are several resources.

What to do if you want to help a neighbor?

- If you have reasons to believe that your neighbor is in danger, always call 911.
- Provide your neighbor with above resources. They will point your neighbor in the right direction.
- Offer to give your neighbor a ride to a shelter, urgent care, ER, as needed.
- Be willing to testify if charges are pressed and witnesses are needed.
- Participate in National Night Out in your block every year. This is a great chance to meet your neighbors, exchange phone numbers, offer help, and stay in touch.

Remembrance of Things Past with Resident Susan Forrest

Susan Forrest remembers watching houses being built down the street from her childhood home near Sanford and Goldfinch. Construction in our neighborhood began in the early 50s but the subdivision was not complete until 1962. Susan grew up here in the early 60s, attending Red Elementary School. She moved away after 5th grade, then returned to the area in 1993. The neighborhood has changed over the years, and Susan was kind enough to share some of her memories of days past. Here are a few of her recollections:

Across the railroad tracks on Willowbend heading toward Stella Link, there was a strip center on the left side of the street, now torn down, that housed a

U-Tote'm and a Mexican restaurant. Susan remembers it was a treat to eat out at the restaurant. On the other side of Willowbend, at the corner of Stella Link, there used to be a one screen drive-in movie theater, where Susan saw the first "Batman" movie. The theater was located in the space now occupied by storage warehouses. Susan thinks the theater may have been called Big Chief or something similar, and recalls her parents blowing cigarette smoke on the kids to keep the mosquitoes off. Many people smoked in those days before warnings on cigarette packages, most cars had no seat belts, and you were really lucky if your automobile had A/C. Diagonally across from the intersection at Stella Link and Willowbend was a small golf course in the space where townhomes are currently being built. Down Stella Link past 610 there was a strip center with a delicatessen/restaurant, Alfred's, a neighborhood institution for many years until it was replaced by Conn's Appliances and other stores, most of which are also long gone. There was another drive-in theater with three screens, the McLendon Triple, nearby on Main Street.

Speaking of Main, Susan remembers that before the street was widened and elevated, our neighborhood was very quiet, sometimes eerily silent. Before Beren Academy and the retention pond were built, the back of the neighborhood was a heavily wooded area of dense underbrush and trees known to the locals as "The Woods". Horses were pastured in the fields on both sides of Willowbend near the railroad tracks. Susan recalls that trains didn't run every 30 minutes like they sometimes do now. Her family lived on Greenwillow and when a train came by they would run to the back fence to see if it was a passenger train. Susan says there was always a manned caboose, and they would wave to the engineers and conductors, who would sometimes toot the horn. There used to be train tracks down I-10 and along Westpark, which were removed for widening the freeway and expanding Westpark to create the tollway. The result was an increase in train traffic on the tracks through our area, which along with the widening and elevation of Main and mowing down of the woods in the back of the neighborhood, meant our neighborhood became less quiet than it used to be.

South Post Oak has experienced great changes as well. Near the corner of S. Willow Drive and S. Post Oak, the Christian Assembly of Houston is housed in the building that used to be a bowling alley. Near the Shell gas station at the corner of S. Post Oak and Willowbend was a hamburger restaurant, The Chuck Wagon, which Susan recalls had a big chuckwagon on a sign out front. Down the road was a big A.J. Foyt Chevrolet dealership. Susan recalls a grocery store on S. Post Oak, maybe Belden's or Piggly Wiggly, that after checkout put grocery bags on a conveyor belt that moved them to the front door, where customers picked them up. Wyatt's Cafeteria occupied the space on S. Post Oak where Dona Leti's Mexican Restaurant recently moved in. There was a Pancho's Mexican Buffet in or near the space at one time. Susan remembers there was a little Mexican flag on the table, and customers could "raise the flag" to signal for service. The Walmart site used to be a driving range where you could go and hit golf balls.

When Susan was growing up, the 610 loop was just being built. She says it was built in sporadic sections in the 50s and 60s, starting with the north loop. One of her relatives who lived in Bellaire in the early 60s remembers playing in the dirt and riding his bike along what would become 610 through Bellaire. About this time, the Astrodome was also being built. Construction started in 1963 and was completed in 1965. Susan says that in our neighborhood, they could hear the giant pillars being pounded into the ground. Astroworld opened in 1968. The park was initially a fun, safe place where neighborhood kids could spend

the day without adult supervision, riding the attractions and meeting up with friends. Over time, the park became less safe and closed in 2005. It was demolished in 2006.

Nearby Meyerland Center was a big draw for neighborhood shopping and entertainment. It originally consisted of buildings arranged around a center courtyard open to the sky, with an assortment of small shops and bigger department stores opening onto the courtyard. On one corner of the center was Woolworth's, a five and dime store that later became an antique store with lots of little booths selling all manner of goods. The three screen Meyerland Cinema was a big draw – Susan saw the movie "Dark Shadows" there when she was in 7th grade. She remembers that on July 4, the center used to shoot fireworks either from the theater roof or a nearby field, and everybody in the surrounding neighborhoods drove over, spread towels on top of their cars, and sat on top of the cars to watch the fireworks. There was an AMC multiplex theater behind Randall's that connected to the area near Hu's Garden Restaurant through a center courtyard with a clock tower. Marco's Mexican Restaurant was across the courtyard entrance from Hu's.

Another popular family place that people in our neighborhood enjoyed was Westbury Square on W. Bellfort near Chimney Rock, where Home Depot is now, along with a few rotting remnants of the old buildings. Westbury Square was modeled on an old-fashioned town square, with a fountain in the middle and small shops down two "streets" and around the square. There was a candle maker, a glass blower, a pizza parlor and a bigger store called Cargo Houston, similar to Pier One, where you could browse for all kinds of funky items. There was a jewelry store, The Smuggler's Chest, where teen girls like Susan could find a peace sign on a chain. On the square was Rumpleheimer's ice cream parlor. The whole area was a safe place where families went after dinner on a weekend night. Kids were able to wander around by themselves, browsing in shops and meeting friends. It was a place where parents could simply say, "meet us back at the fountain in an hour" without any worries.

No reminiscence of Houston would be complete without at least a few memories of torrential rains and street flooding. Susan remembers walking her dog to the intersection of Willowilde and Goldfinch after a heavy rain in '94 or '95. The street dips a bit there, and the water was thigh deep. Susan recalls that her dog swam in it. With every hurricane or heavy rain, streets flooded but luckily few houses in our neighborhood were affected in the way that areas around Braeswood Bayou have been. Susan notes that it used to be that a home near the bayou was a desirable place, a location where you could cross the street and walk along the bayou. Hurricane Harvey, the Memorial Day storm, the Tax Day storm, and all the other floods changed that.

It's interesting to reflect on all the things that have changed in our area over the years. Big changes continue to happen now, with the closing of Randall's and the opening of new businesses in the center across the freeway from Meyerland. Susan notes that when she moved back in 1993, she was the young one and her neighbors were all in their 60s and 70s. Now she's older and her neighbors are young, but she still loves her house and the area. One thing that hasn't changed is the character of our small section of Houston. People volunteer to clean up the main roads, to help lost and abandoned animals, and to host National Night Out, along with many other projects. Happily, our neighborhood continues to be a friendly, safe place where people care about their neighbors and their community. May it always be so.


